Christmas - too early?

Have you heard Christmas music yet? It's a little scary how early this starts. It seems for some the earlier the Christmas celebrations can get underway the better. For others waiting until much closer to the time is a good idea. In each scenario there is a sense of anticipation, and this is part of the time of year we are in. There is anticipation for the coming holiday season, which many families will enjoy to varying degrees. For some, the season will bring a reminder of loss, of empty seats and places, of grief. For others no such sense



but one of excitement and joy. For others perhaps an interesting mix of both where joy and sorrow sit unusually comfortably together. Our lives are dynamic and complex and in this mix stands the constant and dependable promise that our saviour, Jesus, is with us, this is the very essence of Christmas - the reminder of this promise. We can both anticipate this: His presence as He has promised to never leave us nor forsake us. We can also see through our history that this is true and therefore we can anticipate the promise of the Christmas season to be a sure and dependable - and this is surely a hope to celebrate and find joy in - no matter our circumstance. We aim to capture the depth of this in our programmes at ACS as we lead into the final part of 2024.

We have a range of aspects in the life of ACS to anticipate and celebrate - read on.

ERO report on ACS - A celebration!

Earlier in the year ERO reviewed our school and it's functions. The report is now on the ERO website (https://ero.govt.nz/institution/82/aidanfield-christian-school) and is worth a read. Overall it is very positive and acknowledges the work that our staff team do day in and day out. It would appear you can have confidence that we are doing a good job!

Enrolment scheme - This is an anticipation. As mentioned before, the Ministry of Education has run a consultation period on the Christian School Networks enrolment scheme. This plays a significant role in determining who is able to gain entry to our school. We are now waiting to hear the final outcome of what the new scheme will look like. The scheme for our school is very important as it guides the decisions on who we are able to offer places to for the coming year. We have received over 300 applications for the 2025 year and as such clear guidance about priorities is vital.

Roll increase - This is both a celebration and an anticipation. What is exciting is the Ministry of Education have now granted our school a maximum roll increase over the next six years. In 2025 and 2026 we have a maximum roll of 450, an increase of 25 from this year. We are then able to grow by 25 students each year to a maximum roll of 550 in 2030. This is exciting for the many families who apply and who have not been able to gain enrolment to our school - we can now take more families in. The Proprietor has now begun the design process for new building additions to allow us to have classrooms for this increase and begin to have specialist rooms for the Arts and Technology. We intend to build through 2027 with new rooms available just in time in 2028. Your attendance dues are what pay for the new buildings and the ones we currently have - in this regards...thank you!

The Proprietor and Board have been working to achieve the 550 maximum roll since 2010 and it is a real blessing to finally have this approved. On this journey many families have commented that they do not want to lose the small school feel. They said this when we were 150 students and again when we were 250 students, and again 350 students...it seems we still have an aspect of this community based school and we are confident we can maintain this all the way to 550 students. We are community focused and relationally based.

Class placements 2025 - this is definitely anticipation! We do not ask for parent feedback on class placements. We retain the job of deciding which child goes in which class and with who. All our classes are mixed for very good reason and we spend considerable time and energy doing this well.

Friendship is only one aspect considered and is not the defining decision maker for placements. Sometimes we get feedback that a class placement has caused a child all sorts of issues over the summer break. Such change and challenge is resilience building for most children. Our experience shows that even the most anxious child adapts quickly to new classes, teachers and student groups and does the year well. I encourage you to trust our process when you get the class placement letter at the end of the year. Please also be aware that we are mixing up our teaching teams and have new teachers at all levels.

New Staff, 2025 - Definitely celebration! As mentioned above, we are moving many of our teachers around the levels and we have now made appointments for 2025 and we have the following new teachers joining our teams: Mrs Steph Gennills (New Entrants), Miss Grace Herring (Year 1 and 2), Ms Teresa Kim (Year 3 and 4), Mrs Sharon Yule is now with us permanently and in Year 5 and 6 in 2025 and Mrs Qaylah Beckmann joins the year 7 and 8 team. Mrs Ruth Richardson returns to Year 7 and 8 and Mrs Toni-Lee Nasolo returns as our kapa haka oversight and release teacher across a range of levels. Two of these teachers are getting married in the near future and names will change! Each is an excellent teacher and we look forward to welcoming each to our teaching team. If praying is something you do - please uphold our staff in your prayers as they lead and guide your young people.

Using the Carpark - a frustration! I have to admit to being more than frustrated at how some people use the carpark and kiss and drop zone. Any car that stops in the driveway so that others cannot get past is causing significant frustration - and it happens almost every day unless a school staff member is out there to ask people to move. DO NOT BLOCK THE DRIVEWAY - please! When a car stops so others cannot get past it backs traffic out to Aidanfield Drive and sometimes back past the bridge, stops buses moving down the road, hinders the public using Aidanfield Drive and causes danger - just so a parent does not need to go around the circle again because their child isn't ready. Please think of others and do not block the driveway. The whole thing works beautifully if we all do what is right. Thank you to those parents that arrive five to 10 minutes later - it spreads the load of traffic and is actually much quicker for everyone genius idea - thank you.

End of year and prizegiving's - anticipation and celebration

We are five weeks from finished for the year. We have our final full school prizegiving at the Lincoln Events Centre. Some parents ask why? Why in Lincoln? Why the whole school when we don't know most of the students who go across the stage? Why do the juniors have to sit for so long? And, why is it at such an awkward time?

Lincoln event centre is the only venue that is an achievable price and holds the number of people we need space for - close to 1000 now. It is worth the trip to Lincoln so we are able to be together.

But, why do we need to be together? Because we are a community of people and we want our students to understand that they are part of the larger community of our school - it fosters a sense of belonging, a pride in a place and helps to make students feel a part of something bigger than their corner. We also know that your students watching older students is inspiring. We have so many conversations with our older students who talk of seeing 'bigger kids' getting acknowledged and deciding they wanted to achieve well, do that job, strive for that leadership position. In this sense the whole school prize giving is not so much about the adults - its mostly about our students. We pick the awkward time so as to allow as many parents as want to be there the possibility of being there - even those that work until 5pm - it is inclusive. It also allows the younger students to perhaps have a later night than usual - but not terribly late. As we meet together, we can celebrate with our students, the year that has gone and give honour to our Lord for His faithfulness.

We invite you to join us at Lincoln Events Centre on Thursday night 12 December. All students need to be dropped off no later than 5pm. The event starts at 5.30 and usually runs for between 1.45 and 2.00 hours although we try to keep it shorter.

The final day of school is Friday 13 December. Students are to be picked up between 12.30 and 12.50 please.

More details will around end of year arrangement will follow in a few weeks time, please keep an eye out for it.



A REMINDER FOR US ALL

Park smarter around schools

Help us create a safer environment around your kura – for all ākonga (students), mātua (parents) and kaimahi (staff).

Common parking restrictions

Parking restrictions are in place to help keep everyone safe and reduce congestion.



This will be at the safest drop-off and pick-up place. You can stop here for three minutes only – enough time for children to say goodbye and leave the car.



This means parking is restricted to the number of minutes on the sign. P120 means you can only stop there for 120 minutes.



Broken yellow lines along the edge of the road mean you can't stop, pull over, or park there at any time.



You must leave a one metre gap between your car and any driveway.



You must not park your car on the footpath or in a way that blocks the footpath.



You must not stop or park within six metres of any crossing or intersection.

Breaking these rules can result in a fine.
